The church has loads of money.....















The Church Commissioners

Assets valued at £9 billion

Creating about £330m income per year.

They pay for:

- Clergy pensions earned before 1998 (there are as many retired clergy as active clergy)
- 144 Bishops (Diocesan and Suffragan) & their houses and offices
- Some costs of Archbishop's Council and National Church
- Support for the least wealthy dioceses
- Investment in new mission initiatives





Church Commissioners support for Ely Diocese

- 2 Bishops + houses + 4 office staff + expenses
- Bishop's hospitality (marquee events)
- Half the cost of curates
- Most of the cost of training ordinands
- Half the costs of the Changing Market Towns project (£2.5m)
- National projects: A Church near you, Living Faith, Thy Kingdom Come, national Safeguarding, HR, Church buildings council etc.

We pay towards the National Church (synod, Church House, oversees links etc.) £600,000



Clergy now and then:









Why do the clergy cost so much?

- National standard stipend meant to be enough to live on
- Probably worth between £40 50k (classroom teacher £37k, police officer £30k, accountant £30-35k)
- Clergy are not allowed a 2nd job
- Clergy not housed in retirement
- Paid to all clergy regardless of how many parishes
- Has to be paid by the Diocese, even if parishes refuse
- No central church contribution
- Includes a proportion of on-costs of diocese
- Church receives no support from Government (except charity status)





Ministry Share – what does it pay for?

- Clergy vicars, curates and archdeacons
- Clergy training –half the costs of some, all of others
- LLM training & ALM training & vocations department
- Clergy housing (150 properties) maintenance, & gardens
- Clergy council tax and pension and NI (150 clergy)
- Church schools' department (DBE)
- Clergy and lay development courses, retreats, supervision
- Safeguarding, Church buildings (DAC), legal (registry), finance teams






Income 2023 4% Ministry Share and Fees -£6.0m 32% Investments and lettings -£3.0m Other income - £0.4m 64%





Expenditure 2023



- Parish clergy direct costs -£5.3m
- Total local support costs -£2.2m
- National Church £0.6m
- Curates, Ordinands and vocations - £1.0m
- Other investment in the future £0.2m
- Ely 2025 Programme Office - £0.2m





How do we pay our Ministry Share?

- Parish Giving Scheme/Gift Aid
- Contactless giving (approx. £1k per machine)
- Events fetes, beer festivals, Harvest suppers, concerts
- Grants parish council, local charity, warm hub,
- Legacies and bequests
- Sponsorship
- Friends Groups
- Heritage tours, guide books, website giving
- Performance venue, catering
- Innovation: sell your own gin, honey, calendar, books, patchwork....





What happens if we can't pay Ministry Share?

- Inform your Deanery treasurer as soon as possible
- Warn the Diocese (Archdeacon, Finance Dept)
- Pray for ideas and new givers
- Give something away
- Develop a recovery plan
- Get a card reader
- Renegotiate your insurance
- Run a stewardship campaign (ask Martin Kenward)
- Ask people to increase their giving
- Set up a Friends Group
- Talk to your Rural Dean about the way ahead.....
