

REFLECTION FOR DECEMBER

Inspiration for provoking thought is not limited to the bible. In these far from normal times I have not limited my reading plan to that great book (although that would normally be enough on its own) but I am reading or re-reading a number of classics, including Robinson Crusoe (which I am not sure I have ever read beyond children's versions and which I thoroughly recommend).

The following extract is on his recovering from a serious illness some years after his shipwreck and arrival on his island (my apologies for it being so long, but Mr Defoe cannot be accused of brevity in his literary style):

I missed the fit for good and all, though I did not recover my full strength for some weeks after. While I was thus gathering strength, my thoughts ran exceedingly upon this scripture, "I will deliver thee;" and the impossibility of my deliverance lay much upon my mind, in bar of my ever expecting it: but as I was discouraging myself with such thoughts, it occurred to my mind, that I pored so much upon my deliverance from the main affliction (ie to be rescued from the island), that I disregarded the deliverance I had received; and I was, as it were, made to ask myself such questions as these; viz. Have I not been delivered, and wonderfully too, from sickness? from the most distressed condition that could be, I had not owned and been thankful for that as a deliverance, and how could I expect greater deliverance? This touched my heart very much and immediately I kneeled down, and gave God thanks aloud, for my recovery from my sickness.

How often do we make the mistake of failing to be grateful for what we do have rather than being angry or disappointed at not receiving what we wish for? God always answers our prayers, but not always as we expect, so we need to be on the lookout.

In my own situation I have found an extension of this principle to be very helpful: to be grateful and happy for the good times we had rather than to be angry and sad for the good times we might have had in the future. In fact, so much so that people are sometimes surprised at how positively I can express my thanks for the nearly 60 years of happiness Susan and I shared rather than regret at the sadness of it not still being the same.



Susan's funeral was, as you would expect, very difficult for her family and we were all buoyed up by the huge amount of support given by you all, thank you. In addition to the limited number of those of us in church over 70 groups and individuals joined with us via Zoom which was amazing. All areas of Susan's life were represented, her relatives, church family, friends and neighbours, Mothers' Union contacts from everywhere and those we shared time with on the river. Over 200 people and groups have sent a card or letter, most mentioning some memorable occasion shared with Susan! All this shows how she connected with others and made an impact on lives. I am also now able to report that over £2000 has been donated in her memory to the Mothers' Union and it is my sincere hope that this will enable the impact she made to continue to be effective in some way. It is a truly magnificent sum and the family's appreciation goes to all who contributed to make it so.

I love lights. Whether it's the warm rays of the sun, the bright flames of a bonfire or the twinkling lights on a Christmas tree. Light lifts my spirits and I feel happier. We are in Advent, the season before Christmas as we wait for the coming of the Christmas child. Do you have an Advent calendar and/or an Advent candle? As a small child I loved the anticipation of opening a numbered window or door throughout December till Christmas Eve. It was exciting to see what was behind the number for that day and let the light shine through the picture which was revealed, perhaps a cracker, a toy drum or a star. Then there was the flare of the flame as the match lit the wick of the Advent candle and watching the wax slowly melt away the small section for each day. (I still treat myself to this annual ritual - an important part of preparing for Christmas and the calendars and candles are sent to wherever my children/ grandchildren are - Shanghai and New York State this year).

This year we are surrounded by darkness- the pandemic looms large, alongside the ever-present wars, hunger, poverty, loss of employment, the effects of climate change, and the results of domestic and sexual abuse. It is important that we look forward to the Light before it comes. The calendar or candle can provide us with our own small light in this world which can feel hostile and forbidding. The light invites us to look beyond the darkness and to trust in our gift for God, in the new-born child, who lights up our heart, no matter how desperate we may feel. Be guided by the unexpected lights and those that refuse to be extinguished because God is always with us. The seasons of Advent and Christmas which fall in our midwinter give us the opportunity to become the bearers of a light, kindled by the Spirit, to give hope in a world of darkness.

December is a month of expectation, anticipation and hope. Christmas is God's gift to us of His son, who is visible and tangible to everyone who is looking and seeking. Let us share the mystery - to look beyond our lighted windowpane candles as part of our own Advent journey. We are invited to knock on the door and enter into the divine mystery as we celebrate the birth of our Saviour, Jesus Christ.

REFLECTION FOR FEBRUARY

About the time of writing this it is *already* 4 months since dear Susan passed away and I am *already* a quarter of the way through reading the bible, a task I set myself about 3 months ago. I say *already* since the intervening time seems to have passed very quickly whilst, at the time of the event or decision, both seemed to be challenges which I was not sure how to deal with. These are examples of how amazingly resilient we are as humans and how well we can cope with whatever life throws at us. Each such event or decision contributes to what we are, our identity, and taking any one away would make us a different person to who we are. Pip in Charles Dickens' Great Expectations puts it rather well - *"That was a memorable day for me, for it made great changes in me. But it is the same with any life. Imagine one selected day struck out of it, and think how different its course would have been. Pause you who read this, and think for a moment of the long chain of iron or gold, of thorns or flowers, that would never have bound you, but for the formation of the first link on one memorable day."*

How different my life would have been without the riches Susan brought following our chance pairing in a lunchtime dance class at school. And the events consequent upon the moment Susan decided to follow her mother and become an active member of the Mothers' Union were transformative (in a good way) for us both. More recently, I remember the day I determined I was going to read the bible and now experience growing enlightenment every day from new passages. It is, in fact, so successful that I have now added reading the MU Prayer Diary every day and find it surprisingly rewarding, possibly as I am looking up where the places we pray for are in the world with some results which are surprise me!

If we can deal with the shock of losing someone so close to us, so that, unthinkable at the outset, we even become comfortable in that loss, or make decisions which appear at the start to be virtually impossible to achieve but which become by our perseverance almost easy, then there is surely nothing that, given the will to succeed, we cannot do. So take heart, there is hope even in the darkest of places and with God's grace success can come out of each decision we make and circumstance in which we find ourselves, however unlikely that may seem at the outset.

I leave you with a little challenge: to read Proverbs 8. It is written in praise of Wisdom, that essential but rare commodity. I have struggled with much of Proverbs but this makes eminent sense to me and I hope you find it so too. With the application of Wisdom at least the decisions we take, and our response to circumstances in which we find ourselves, have a better chance of happy outcomes and of making us better people of God.

Trustees have agreed that the money donated in memory of Susan will be held by the Diocese in a restricted fund named the **Susan Baker Family Fund.** Susan was very committed to our MU work helping families in both this country and worldwide. Over £2000 has already been given and as Philip said '*The family are convinced that this is exactly what Susan herself would have wanted to happen (although I am also sure that she would have been amazed at the generosity by so many contributors which has brought it about!)'.* From this year when branches wish to allocate donations to specific projects it will be on the list alongside AFIA, Worldwide and Diocesan Fund.

Sawston Branch held its first meeting of 2012 by zoom on Thursday 14 January. Thirteen people joined the call and we had a nice service led by the Rev Petra Shakeshaft, and prayers by Rosey Fuell. Our AGM will be on Thursday 18 February and we are putting together a programme of monthly meetings by Zoom until the restrictions ease

Burwell Branch also met using Zoom, on Wednesday 25th January. Simon Rogers gave an interesting talk on 'My Christian Journey'. Meetings will continue by Zoom on the 4th Wednesday of the month at 3pm until we can meet together in person.

Faith In Action – February 2021

Hazel's Reflection for January's Thursday Prayer recalled all we had done during 2020 to support the vulnerable in our local community, and afar, and to live out our MU 5th Aim.

A GREAT BIG THANK YOU for all the Christmas Giving to the Refuges and Hostels we support. I have received many grateful thanks, in person and by email, from Support Workers.

"I just want to let you know that the Asda vouchers had arrived safely and will be of great use to the families in refuge".

"I would like to say a massive thank you on behalf of all the women it will support. Aldi vouchers are so perfect as they stretch the budget a little further and are the closest store for the women to get to".

"It is very kind of the Mothers' Union Branches to keep raising money to support the refuge and these vouchers will be most welcome".

Before Christmas we were able to pass on warm clothing and blankets to help the homeless in Wisbech, many household goods were given to hostels/refuges and Maureen took a fully laden car of knitting to Christian Hope International. We also delivered knitted items to Hinchinbrooke, the Baby hats were greeted with "You are the best – Thank You", and for the soft twiddle muffs the Frailty Nurse wrote "They are beautiful and ideal for our patients".

We have now been asked if we could make some lap blankets for the Elderly Frail, these can be knitted or crocheted.

It is always a thrill to receive a bag of beautifully knitted goods, so many items made with love and care.

We have a new outlet for baby goods – Fenland Family and Baby Bank is based at March, and caters for children up to 5 years old. Maureen has contact details. Ely baby Bank is now well established and is proving a much needed resource.

In these unusual times there have been ingenious ways used to raise money without meeting together. Many branches are well supported by their church communities; advertising our projects raises awareness of the work we do, and helps us have more to pass on. Unfortunately there continues to be a great need for foodbanks; and the refuges are busier than ever. With Lent approaching perhaps your branch would like a Lent Project – collecting toiletries, cleaning items, tinned and packet goods, or something similar. Whatever you do, it will be most welcome.

Preparing for Easter

We are in the church's season of Lent during which we are encouraged to give more of our time and ourselves to prayer, fasting and study. A time to review our faith journey as we travel towards the gift of Easter.

Traditionally we were encouraged, and the emphasis was placed, on fasting and penitence. As a child I well remember the sound of my pocket money falling through the slot in my Lent collecting box for Overseas Mission, every week during Lent. Today we are given a far wider choice as our way of life has changed and giving up something with meaning now may include a time without social media as an alternative to biscuits or chocolate. We have also been offered this season as an opportunity to increase our giving in time or money to those who are in need, and this year, that may include an extra phone call to someone living alone. Group Bible study and prayer are often well supported during Lent and lockdown may not make this possible for many but this time may be used as a special time of private prayer to strengthen our relationship with God. There is no one way suits all - what is difficult for one of us may be very easy for another - so we each need to look around and find the Lent discipline which best tests/suits us. In a year of changes do look at the MU Family Lent Calendar for 2021 which provides a wide variety of ideas.

Spending so much time in the house I have turned to a book which helps to find God in everyday items and which may transform our approach to each new day. At Home in Lent (an exploration of Lent through 46 objects) by Gordon Giles, published by BRF, was inspired by Neil MacGregor's 2010 BBC Radio 4 Series The History of the World in 100 objects. It reinforces that the way we live is spiritual as well as practical and we are invited to discover through daily readings that God is already in our homes. Whether you are a minimalist or a collector of 'stuff' are you ready to open your heart and mind as well as your door to let God in?

For many of us our home is not complete without a garden, patio pot or window box. The fruits from outside enter our homes in vases, the pantry or the fridge/freezer. As the weather continues to improve and we are able to spend more time outside we are able to thank God for the signs of new life around us - a foretaste of the new life and joy in the promise of Christ's resurrection.

Dear Lord, Let us take the opportunity of Lent to enjoy the fulfilling labour of working alongside the master gardener to clear our lives ready for fruitfulness. Let us surrender to God the barren ground of good intentions and unfulfilled aims. Let us be ready for Him to prune us so that more fruit can be produced. May we revel in His closeness as He tends our hearts and plants the seeds of new growth in our lives. Amen (Praying in every Season - MU prayer book)

REPORT ON THE WOMEN'S REFUGE FEBRUARY 2021

This past year has been a particularly difficult and busy one at the Mid-Cambridgeshire Women's Refuge, due mainly to the pandemic and the restrictions imposed by the lockdowns. Putting measures in place to keep everyone at the Refuge safe from the virus has been a real challenge. There has been an increase in the demand for places as domestic violence has increased across the country, but the Refuge can only accommodate eight women and their children at any given time. As soon as one moves on to their own accommodation their place has been immediately filled. As Tina said a few days ago, "There has been so much coming and going we don't know whether we're coming or going most of the time!" ("We" being Tina herself and her assistant, Carolyn).

During lockdown they had to make the decision not to accept any donations of goods so would-be donors have had to keep the goods on hold or dispose of them to other charities. Between the lockdowns however Tina was able to take several loads of donated goods, and these had to be stored for three days in an outside storeroom before they could be used. In the weeks leading up to Christmas gifts, especially vouchers for Tesco and other supermarkets, toys, chocolates, sweets and cleaning materials came pouring in and as always were gratefully accepted. This year I was able to pass on a larger total value of vouchers than in any previous year, £510! These were all donated by MU branches or churches in Ely Diocese. Our own MU branch members contributed £150 worth. The staff at the Refuge do not distribute all the vouchers to the women residing there over the Christmas period, but throughout the year as new residents arrive in need of financial support until they begin to receive their benefits.

Each new arrival receives a welcome package and another when they leave, and this always includes some cleaning materials as well as toiletries and towels. Donations of these items are therefore always needed in addition to dry and packaged groceries, nappies and sanitary items, children's clothing (good as new) and bedding, which can only be accepted if brand new during the present time. Household goods especially kitchenware is also greatly needed for the women when they leave and move into their own accommodation. Last year someone offered a vacuum cleaner and another a microwave, and these were gratefully accepted. Tina is always willing to collect such items when available.



My Dad!

Frank Henry Burton was born in Ironbridge, Shropshire in December 1925. He grew up in North Devon and Somerset, the family finally settling in Burnham on Sea (where I was born!) and Frank went to school there, later winning a scholarship to go to the boy's Grammar School in Bridgewater. He left at 14, did several jobs, including working in a gentleman's outfitters and joined the RAF in 1944. After the initial training he was then recruited as a wireless operator. After the war finished, he started working for the MoD in Somerset, where he married Dorothy (my Mum!). Nine and a half years later (when I was two and a half), we moved to South East London, Frank worked at the Woolwich Arsenal, at Berkeley Square in the City and Mottingham with a brief spell in BAOR in Rheindahlen, Germany. His last working days were at RAE Farnborough, where he was a senior accountant.

Frank retired in 1985 and they returned to live in Burnham on Sea, Somerset. He was very busy doing voluntary work with the WRVS and Highbridge Festival of the Arts. He and Dorothy returned to St Andrew's



Frank touched the lives of so many during his 95 years, he was a shining example of the Mothers' Union ethos of upholding family life and marriage, his own lasting well over 60 years.

ELECTIONS for 2022 - 25

2021 is the last year of this Triennial and it does not seem over two years since I became **Ely MU Diocesan President.** Much has happened - most of it totally unexpected. I have used my telephone and the post more than ever, not to mention e-mails and Zoom (which I had never heard of last March)! Last month I was nominated for another three years as president by the trustees and am delighted to have been elected. I have carried out only one 'engagement' in person over the last year and only a few using Zoom in the Diocese, but have tried to keep you all up-to-date with what has been happening via the newsletter. This, like Topsy, has grown because although there were no events to let you know about in advance, task-group leaders and many members have contributed articles. I hope you have enjoyed having something to read and help you retain contact with the 'outside world'.

Thursday prayer was another event that had to change, as the Cathedral and churches were closed. It has been a delight to hear how many enjoy having the short Thursday Prayer service sent or delivered to them each month as well as those who are enjoying it on Zoom, who could not have made the journey to attend in person, even when it was possible to do so.

The next stage of elections is about to start with **nominations for trustees** for the next three years. Some are intending to stand for another three years but others have come to the end of their six years so are unable to stand again, and others are moving on. Nomination papers will be sent to all branch leaders. If you are interested in taking a more active role in the diocese, beyond your branch, please ask your branch leader for the papers. At the end of the newsletter there is information outlining the roles of trustees, as well as the areas that each task group covers. Many who are interested come in through this route initially if there is a role in a task group that they would enjoy and like to help with. Nominations need to be in to Ros Wright, MU diocesan secretary by Monday April 12th.

Faith In Action – Jean Webb Task Group Coordinator

It is always good to receive messages of thanks and I have 3 recent ones I would like to share with you, for it is your enthusiasm, generosity and skill that has made them possible.

The first is from Cambridge Women's Aid, I know several branches sent gift vouchers at Christmas. The other 2 Refuges we support would say something similar, and are always most grateful for anything we provide (although often restricted for storage space).

"Thank you so much for sending us the vouchers. All the vouchers you send are passed on to women who either have no or low income and are therefore unable to buy enough food or necessary items for themselves and their families. A voucher is very well received as it does not carry the stigma that some women feel is attached to food banks. It means that the woman can buy what she needs and what she wants - rather than what might be available at a food bank.

Sometimes the women will use supermarket vouchers to purchase school uniform items for their children. All school aged children who come into refuge will start at a new school and they often need to get a few new items.

Part of our role is to support women to access their entitlement to benefits, but there can often be a considerable delay between making the claim and receiving the payment. Many women will come into refuge with virtually no money, and often with debt, through no fault of their own. It goes without saying, that once a woman has a safe roof over her head and has funds to support herself and her children, she can take the first steps to starting a new safer life.

There is no doubt that the vouchers you have given will make a considerable difference to the women who receive them".

We had a mention in the March Newsletter of Future Care Solutions, one of the Care companies we have provided with Soft Twiddle Muffs. Alongside a picture of a Twiddle Muff they wrote –

"This is a thick hand muff with bits and bobs (twiddles) attached inside and out. It is designed to provide a stimulation activity for clients with dementia, who often have restless Behaviour. The muffs provide a wonderful source of visual, tactile and sensory stimulation. They are made for us by members of the Mothers' Union of Ely Diocese. Thank you all very much."

Recently I have been asking for some lap blankets for Hinchingbrooke Frailty Unit. Sherly, the Frailty Specialist Nurse wrote-

Thanks for all the help, and please do mention our thanks to your Knitters for the great job they are doing. Also, if we could have some more Twiddle muffs please, that would be great.



So, we continue to knit, crochet, collect, fundraise to put our Faith Into Action. Thank you all.

REFLECTION FOR APRIL-MAY

(19th April 2021)

My secondary school was a Grammar School in Isleworth, west London (or as it was then, West <u>of</u> London). Passing the 11-plus was a big surprise to me, not least since I did not realise I had sat it – it had just been passed off as another "Assessment". However, I turned up to what had all the appearances of a stately home, it having been the country residence of Sir Joseph Banks, the great botanist (among other worthy things). The headmaster must have come with the house – a real Gentleman of the old school. Of course all the masters and mistresses wore full academic robes (except the sports master) and the whole deal was like living in the past. But it was beautiful with incredible grounds, including a fountain (sadly not working). Anyway, back to the head; he sought to drum into us some religious teaching and would refer to God as "The Three P's" which he would go on to define as Perfect Wisdom, Perfect Love, Perfect Knowledge. How's that for succinct?

As is the way of much of what one hears, the full understanding of that phrase took time to sink in and it was not until long after I left school that the meaning of it made sense to me. As I write this, I am in day 182 of my (365 day) bible reading plan, so I am almost exactly half way through reading the whole bible. I must say it has been very easy, but then it is a great story! But reading whole books, not just the extracts we receive during the services and so on, sets a scene within which the meaning of our church readings make better sense and the whole story comes alive.

Sometimes simple things carry huge meaning which passes us by because we do not recognise the setting within which it sits. The Mothers' Union Prayer Diary for 2021 had "Simplicity" as the theme for week commencing 11th April and on Saturday 17th (which would have been Susan's birthday) we were reminded that, in Matthew 6:25-34, Jesus gives us this simple but profound message: "Do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will wear. Do not worry about tomorrow; tomorrow will take care of itself." This is more true when you consider that other oft-quoted phrase: "You do not know what tomorrow will bring" – i.e. we cannot see into the future. Of course, to some extent we have to have a plan, but how good it would be if we could stop overthinking everything we do, worrying about all the things which might go wrong and how we can overcome them if they do. Think about how much less worrying we would do and how much more time we would have to do important things, like getting to know Jesus better.

Faith In Action News– May '21

Throughout the past year, the work of the Faith In Action Task Group has continued whenever possible. Sadly, the most beneficial work within Little Hey prison has not happened, but I am sure the inmates have been remembered in prayer.

We were able to provide 5 AFIA breaks for needy families at the October half-term, and Di Sabel, our bookings officer is currently arranging some for May half-term. Unfortunately these are restricted in number, and the cost has risen accordingly.

Maureen Haigh, Local Projects Officer has been kept busy throughout, and hostels and refuges supported whenever possible. Knitting continues to be received and thank you all knitters, and those sewing up blankets.

The collections made by branches of toiletries, or cleaning materials have been invaluable, as were all the gift vouchers sent at Christmas. One of the Refuges we support (Mid-Cambs.) has been reviewing how they will be moving forward, out of the crisis, and how we can best support. The refuge suggest **£5 vouchers for Wilco, Home bargains, BM, etc.** which can be used towards new items, giving women the opportunity to choose their own things, and help them regain confidence, self-esteem and contribute towards their mental well-being.

Also, they have asked for support particularly for items less often received **(see below).** If you aren't planning a big branch fundraiser (and I know many branches like to do so in the summer), perhaps consider a collection of items, ask in your church, and use social media if you are familiar with it – here in Ely I have had many people delighted to support our projects in this way. (Mainly young Mums).

Currently Mid-Cambs. have good stocks of second-hand bedding and sanitary products.

I am delighted that the enterprise supporting the homeless in Wisbech, previously known as 50 Backpacks, now named 50/50 Vision, has been absorbed into the work of the Salvation Army. We will be responding with help for warm clothing again when it is requested.

Sixty-two years of Mothers' Union membership

Three weeks after my son John was born, I walked into St Andrew's Church, Bexhill and

spoke with Marion Swift, the MU Enrolling Member, in front of the branch, saying that I wanted to join the Mothers' Union. Marion was shocked by my question and said I should join the Young Wives Club, but I said no, I had



a baby and wanted to join the MU! During the second week of November 1957, I joined the Mothers' Union and was given a preparation card. I took my son with me to the meetings

and communion services, which were held once a month. I was admitted on 10 July 1958 and spent a year being guided by an elderly branch member, who kept in touch after I moved from Bexhill to Ilford, until John was 15 and was confirmed. I joined the St Albans branch in 1959.

St Albans was a younger branch and was much more hands on. Grace Merry was the Enrolling Member and worked at Mary Sumner House. We were a very forward-looking branch and closely involved with the Korean MU and funded a missionary worker. During the Mothers' Union centenary celebrations in 1976, I had a ticket to the service at Westminster Abbey and the reception at Lambeth Palace, where I met the Korean representatives, and was able to send our greetings back with them. By now I had two daughters, Penny and Wendy, and all the children came to church every Sunday, six years down to a babe in the pram. They were quite a handful, but the supportive MU were there helping me through everything, with

encouragement and family life. My Wendy, the youngest, had Alice Hart, a MU friend, as godmother.

In 1967 we moved to Rampton from Ilford and lived in the servants' quarters of the Vicarage, which was great fun and we fostered several children. I joined the local MU branch, who called us as 'the Londoners', but soon we settled to country life and I worked on the land with them. I became Treasurer to the branch and Enrolling Member. Diana Goodhart used to drive through Cottenham and take me to Thursday Prayer at Ely Cathedral every month. also became the Deanery L Praver Representative, encouraging prayer and planning the twice-yearly Quiet Evening and Days.

The MU Quiet Day, which took place at Neil House, Huntingdon Road, Cambridge, was a challenge for me when I felt God had called me to respond to His call. This was not an easy calling in the early 1970s for a woman. I took up the challenge and answered the call, supported by dear Mary Sibson, who encouraged me with her support and prayers. During this time, I trained as a Reader and was licensed as Ely's first women Reader on 30 April 1977, my birthday.

In 1978 I was asked to work with Rev Richard Smart in Dry Drayton, Bar Hill and Madingley, a group of parishes north of Cambridge. I joined the Madingley MU Branch. The Branch had members from all three parishes, whose members were quite a cross section in differing church outlooks: Bar Hill Ecumenical; Dry Drayton – middle-of-the-road Anglican; and Madingley – Prayer Bookoriented. We were led wonderfully by Elizabeth Seale, who was a thoughtful, caring leader for us all. Elizabeth kept in touch with me about MU when I moved to Cambridge to work in the Parish of the Ascension, which had no MU Branch. I trained as a speaker with Norma Emmerton and on 29 September 1980 I became a speaker, and have been asked to speak in many branches about women's ministry. Some members who listened become Readers and some have gone further, which is inspiring for the MU in widening our outreach in differing ways.

After moving to Cambridge I became a Deacon in 1988 at the Parish of the Ascension in Cambridge, and then moved to Cherry Hinton, a large demanding parish. It was an honour to be ordained with the first women in 1994. I kept in touch with the MU through the Diocese and Quiet Days. Cherry Hinton did not have a branch and so I stayed in contact with Elizabeth, who continued to send me the Home and Family magazine.



Bishop John Flack asked me in the year 2000 to become a Canon of Ely Cathedral; I retired in 2004

after nine years at St George's, Chesterton and moved to Sawston. There I met an MU friend, Joan King, who had been the Representative for Young Wives in the past. She invited me to come to St Andrew's, Stapleford, where I was able to join the MU branch and attend their meetings and Quiet Evenings led by Suzanne Watt. The branch asked me from time to time to give talks. There were branch outings to Milton for Sausage Sizzles and meetings and lunches at Mary's and Phillipa's in their lovely garden. I even managed to go to Winchester and Edinburgh with Kay Coe for the Central Council meeting. The picture is of Hilary Street and I running a few yards with Alice Leadbeter, Susan Baker's daughter, welcoming her whilst she was running around all the branches in Ely Diocese to raise money for MU in 2017, before she ran the London Marathon.

Mary Sumner left us quite a legacy to carry on. I look back on the MU members I have met over 62 years, who have been part of my spiritual journey. They are such dedicated group of people who are in the service of their Lord and family life in so many ways. Thank you, Mothers' Union, for the great work you do, giving so much good.

The scope and fellowship of the Mothers' Union help widen our horizons and is definitely worth joining.








EASTER EGGS FOR THE FENLAND REFUGE

It has been a challenging year for many in Great Britain, but Gill Uttin's talk for Thursday Prayers in May, gave us more information about the situation in our link dioceses in Zambia, Rwanda, Nigeria and India. They are having a very difficult time indeed but their MU branches have continued to help others in so many ways. Acting to prevent girls being sold off for early marriage, helping teenage girls (where the pandemic has caused a rise in pregnancies to 30-40 in one parish) as well as preparing meals for those in hospital, are all things that they are dealing with constantly. However the rains have been good in some areas so crops have grown and services are still happening, with social distancing, but are restricted to 1hour 30 minutes!

MU REFLECTION FOR MAY-JUNE

The prayer for Tuesday 11th May in the MU Prayer Diary:

Lord, you are Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end, so we ask you to help us live with eternity in view, trusting that you will inspire us to do what we need to accomplish and that you will be with us as we step out into the unknown.

We read things on a daily basis and, mostly, they slip past our consciousness with hardly a notice. But sometimes we read something and there is that spark in it that attracts our attention and will insist that we pay it our full attention. This prayer was one such for me. Indulge me, and read it through again, taking time to let the words sink in. Now perhaps it is just me but I think it just oozes meaning, every word individually and the whole collectively. If we are serious about our faith surely "living with eternity in view" is a given. But how often do we actually think about it? Praying to be "inspired to do what we need to accomplish" – now there is the whole crux of the matter – what are we to accomplish? Start from an understanding of that and all else falls into place (and, no, I do not yet know what I am intended to accomplish; how many of us really do? I think Susan did, but I think she was an exception). And every day we take steps into the unknown; mostly they are small steps but sometimes they are monumental steps which we never saw coming and needing to be faced; but with our Lord's help, which is always there if we ask for it, all things are doable and no step is too great. Hard possibly, challenging sometimes, daunting always, but with God's guidance, doable. And then the opening phrase "Lord, you are Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end". Can there be a more succinct way of expressing our Lord God's infinity of every dimension – time and space being just those that our limited intellect can even begin to grasp.

So often, in our modern, busy lives, we are in too much of a hurry to pay adequate attention to what we are reading and so only gain a superficial understanding of its meaning. When what we are reading could be instrumental in determining our eternal future surely it must be worth putting everything else on hold for a while, just so that we concentrate fully on what we are doing, thereby gaining so much more out of the experience?



Before Lockdown 3, CHI were able to send **400 boxes** of knitted garments to Eastern Europe through Missions without Borders.

A lovely lady aged 93 with her son came over to Balsham from Upwell bringing me 180 ten inch squares! I felt quite daunted by the amount but I kept 100 to make into 5 blankets and the rest I gave to Maureen – she has members in St Ives who are good at sewing up! Upwell MU has now closed but Margaret is now an Indoor Prayer member – as I am the co-ordinator for the Ely Diocesan MU we made contact with each other. Sadly there are now only 18 IMPC members – when I took over about six years ago there were 50. Each member receives cards at Christmas, Easter and for their birthdays and letters from the Worldwide President, Ely's President and me.

REFLECTION FOR JULY

Philip Baker

Again I take as inspiration a prayer from the MU Prayer Diary, this month from Monday 21st June:

I was a stranger and you welcomed me. Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me. (Matthew 25: 35, 40)

This is one of those passages we all know, but have we really thought through what it means, how profound it is and what it implies we should do? Here is our chance to put that right.

I suggest it might be helpful to turn the statement round and consider it from another direction. We know how we should treat God: were we to meet him, shiny robes, halo and all (so there is no doubt as to his identity!). I have no doubt we would kneel before him and offer ourselves in any way he would use us. We would offer him food, drink, shelter, money – whatever we had. In short, we would do anything for him that he asked. And yet he does ask, all the time, but we do not necessarily respond. The bible is clear about what is expected of us, and that is our guide to a Christian way of life. So what is the difference?

One important reason might be that we do not take the above passage from Matthew seriously enough; we do not see Jesus in the people we meet or in the desperate people we read about in the papers every day. For isn't that the implication of Matthew's words, that we should see Jesus in everyone and treat them as though we were dealing with God himself?

Of course, one does not treat the messenger or, in this case, the substitute, as we would God himself, that would be impractical. But we do need to think about how we should react with all these people in the light of Matthew's words. If, as he says, we are dealing with God through everyone we meet, we should be generous, truthful, welcoming, forgiving, tolerant, interested and all the other things laid out in the bible. In fact, we should deal with all these people as though we were dealing with God – for *just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me*.

Now that leads us to a consideration of how we treat refugees, asylum seekers, the disadvantaged, oppressed and frightened and, indeed, everyone whom we currently wish would go away! In this way, one simple little passage has led us into very tricky waters indeed without a chart showing the safe way through. Answers on a postcard, please.

I offer two books, one that we have read in Trumpington church reading group and one which I have read and have offered to the group for our Autumn book.

Phoebe - A story - by Paula Gooder (Biblical scholar, author and speaker).

Available as paperback or on Kindle Published by Hodder & Stoughton

This a first novel by a well-known theologian about Phoebe a deacon of the church at Cenchreae and St Paul's teaching in the 1st century. It is a wonderful insight into the life and faith of the early church.

You can't hide the Sun by John McCarthy. (A journey through Israel and Palestine)

Black Swan Edition 2013 available in paperback

A personal journey back where he was held hostage to try and understand the day-to-day complexities of being a Palestinian Arab in modern-day Israel. It was published in 2011, is easy to read and I learnt a lot about the problems that still face these people

Two books which I have really enjoyed (historical fiction) are

The Damask Rose by Carol McGrath published by Headline Accent 2021 Paperback ordered through the Mobile Library which visits Balsham twice a month.

This is the story of one of the She Wolves (I think there were three) of England about Eleanor of Castille who was married to Edward 1 (Longshanks and Hammer of the Scots) whom she adored and stuck by his side whether in war or peace.

They married when they were 12 and 13 and she had a baby whilst they were living in Gascony in France (which belonged to England) and before Edward was King. Sadly the baby died as did so many of other children to whom she gave birth – 15 daughters and 3 sons. The book covers the period 1264 (time of Simon de Montfort) to Queen Eleanor's death in 1290. Each place where her funeral cortege stopped en route from Lincoln to London crosses were erected namely Waltham Cross and Charing Cross being the best known. They were both very devout in their prayers, worship and visiting shrines.

The Silken Rose by Carol McGrath also published by Headline Accent perhaps in 2020 in Paperback also ordered through the Mobile Library.

This covers an earlier period of the 13thCentury Ailenor of Provence (Savoy) married to Henry 111 son of King John in her early teens. They were devoted to each other although Henry 111 was not a particularly good King. He rebuilt Westminster Abbey and many cathedrals and castles were built the thirteenth century. I learned a lot about life in the thirteenth century. The Court moved around a great deal always with a large retinue and often stayed abroad for months at a time. Queen Ailenor outlived Henry and was a devoted grandmother to many of the surviving children of Edward 1 and Queen Eleanor.

Candles in the Dark by Rowan Williams SPCK

"Faith, hope and love in a time of pandemic" follows the main title, and gives some clues about what this small but very effective and helpful book is all about.

From March to September 2020, Rowan Williams wrote weekly meditations for the congregation of his parish church in Cambridge. *Candles in the Dark* will be welcomed by all who are looking for light in these dark times. Written with warmth and compassion, it will challenge you, nourish you and leave you with fresh resources for faith to guide you through a still uncertain future.

Each chapter, and therefore meditation, in this short book is about three pages long and easily assimilated. After a short preface, Rowan writes twenty-six short but deep commentaries and reflections on the pandemic and how we might pray and respond as Christians. There is also an epilogue.

I can recommend this book as most helpful in our current circumstances and one which brings hope and direction on the journey. It is also very reasonably priced.

He has a unique understanding and love of children and also a wonderful gift for storytelling. This is a book to relax in and enjoy.

If you have been wondering how to support the Afghans who are coming to this area, **"Love In A Bag Cambridgeshire"** are collecting, and aim to have collection points across the county. Their Wish List is similar to the items we would put in Welcome packs for the refuges and hostels.

Shampoo and conditioner, toothbrush and paste, soap/shower gel, deodorant (and sanitary products).

Extras – a selection from perfume/aftershave, cosmetics, baby/face wipes, tissues, hairbrush/comb/accessories, hand cream/body lotion, stationery, socks, underpants. No scissors/tweezers/razors or other sharps. No food or perishables

All items must be brand new, and in sealed packaging for hygiene. Please put in a bag or Rucksack, and label for man/woman. Include a handwritten note to show someone cares.

In Ely, there is a collection point at The Kings Arms in St Mary's Street. . "Love In A Bag Cambridgeshire" has a Facebook page.

100 Afghan families are going to the Peterborough area in the next three weeks. Mary's Child (see below) is helping with the re-homing. Jean will take a car load when they are ready to accept.

If this appeal becomes oversubscribed, the bags will be passed on to other agencies supporting the homeless.

I'm very pleased to announce that we have a new charity to support in the north of the diocese. Based in Peterborough (the south of the River Nene is in Ely Diocese) **Mary's Child** offers Love, Care and Support to families and individuals. This fits so well with our M U aims to support those whose lives have met with adversity.

REFLECTION FOR SEPTEMBER

Food for thought.

I expect that everyone reading this will know of Delia Smith, either as a kitchen hero or through her connections to Norwich City football club. Not everyone will know she is a catholic (attending daily mass and prayers), is 80 years old and has written a book titled "You Matter", due to be published next March. I discovered this courtesy of The Times newspaper and Andrew Billen, who wrote a piece in the paper's "Comment" section recently.

In her book she says that we need to step back from the chaos and get to know ourselves better: that everyone is unique and has a special place. She claims that we under-estimate what human life means and what it is and why it is. We have this immense universe in which it takes millions of years for light to reach this little place we call Earth, yet it has human life – the only life we know about in the entire universe.

In her estimation the only way we can find meaning is to look at who we are and she describes it thus: "You have only just met me. If you really wanted to know me you would need to spend time with me, otherwise you wouldn't know me. Therefore, human beings need to spend time with themselves in order to know themselves."

I think that is self-evidently true and suggest that, by extension, it must be equally true to state that to know God you need to spend time with God. I have found reading the bible from cover to cover is one way of doing that. I am now well over three-quarters of the way through (actually on day 313 of 365 day reading plan) and the time spent reading and then considering what I have read must add up to over 150 hours in total. In that time I have made many discoveries about what the bible is and, from the different approaches taken by the writers of the many constituent books, a "picture" of God as a being (albeit a very different being from any encountered on earth).

Throughout the bible we are told we must love our God. Easy to say, but it is hard to love someone you do not know. So, getting to know him is just a step to the big prize of loving him. There are many ways of spending time with God and getting to know him better, such as meditation and prayer, but the important point to understand is that the effort is worth it. Without spending time with God there is no way to know God and without that knowledge one cannot love God. So "thank you" Delia for your forthcoming book and, as I started this piece – food for thought!

Everyone received the Ely Diocesan MU Annual Report earlier this year in April. This outlined all the activities of the previous year. The finances of our charity have now been passed by the Independent Examiner and sent off to the Charity Commission. If you would like to view them, they will shortly be on the Ely Diocesan website under the Mothers' Union section. If you are unable use the internet please get in touch and I will send them to you.

It has been agreed that the subscriptions for next year will remain at £20, which will all go to our national charity. Members have been very generous raising money for national and local campaigns and still have the option of giving to the Diocesan General Fund if they wish. In the classic novel by Charles Dickens "Oliver Twist", the following passage appears just over half way through: "Men who look on nature, and their fellow-men, and cry that all is dark and gloomy, are in the right; but the sombre colours are reflections from their own jaundiced eyes and hearts. The real hues are delicate, and need a clearer vision." Now what do these words, from a work of fiction, have to do with us? I suggest that, fiction or not, this passage states a truth, which is that we see things, and interpret them, in a particular way according to our background, our experiences and even our mood at the time. For example, I see a wonderful sunset and think "God's world has perfection all through it and we should take more care of it" whilst someone else will see the manifestation of a physical phenomenon concerning the refraction of light. Both thoughts are true, but it demonstrates how one's own viewpoint causes the focus to be different. So, how we understand what we see is actually dependant on ourselves and is not a fixed, unalterable "truth".

Now this has a bearing on how we deal with some of the big issues of our time, such as gender-based violence (especially against women), modern day slavery, refugee crisis and all those living in fear, pain, poverty and ignorance. We were discussing these issues and the potential Mothers' Union reaction, both local and national, to them, at our last Branch Meeting and the quoted passage above might explain some of the difficulties we have in finding solutions – if we all see the problems differently, how can we ever agree the solutions!

We need to shine a light on those things we can agree as "facts" so that a common focus on each issue becomes possible. A girl might appear to dress provocatively, but she is not inviting a predatory and unwelcome approach – she may be exhibiting naivety, but that is all. A refugee is not responsible for the armed insurrection in their home country – they almost certainly would prefer to remain where they were born but for circumstances beyond their control. A person trapped in a modern slavery situation (such as a car wash operation or by illegal gang-masters) is only trying to earn money for their family to ease their poverty and hunger – they cannot recognise the depths to which some unscrupulous individuals will go in order to make a profit. But in all these examples there is a tendency to see the victim as somehow responsible for their own predicament, so why should we help? Or we see a problem too great for us to deal with, it is too "gloomy", when actually all that is needed is a little sympathy and support.

When we see or hear of someone in a bad way, we need to look beyond that first impression, which is always subjective, and seek an objective view so we can see the "real hues". If we could then find that common view, based on the bare facts discernible only by a clear vision, some of the injustices that exist around the world and even here closer to home would not be tolerated. The Mothers' Union offers unique opportunities to help those in need, and does so to a great extent. But if we could see with that "clearer vision" from the quoted passage, rather than through the filter of our own "jaundiced eyes and hearts", maybe together we could achieve so much more.





WAVE OF PRAYER

Ely Diocesan Mothers' Union is linked with five other Dioceses across the world and each year we pray for each other frequently as well as a specially chosen three days which appear in our Prayer Calendar.

This year it is on the 10th, 11th and 12th December and Deaneries across our diocese will take it in turn to pray for our link diocese -<u>Shyogwe</u> in Rwanda, <u>Lusaka</u> in Zambia, <u>Sokoto</u> and <u>Ika</u> in Nigeria and <u>Karimnagar</u> in India.

All of our link diocese has had Covid problems. Shortage of vaccines, restrictions on travel, social distancing, sanitising and loss of loved ones are the norm but we here have not had to contend with constant deadly attacks on vulnerable people, kidnapping of students, greatly increased pregnancy rates and poor harvests. Where people have been able to meet together services are now restricted to only 1hr 30mins!

Prayer is a powerful tool and it is uplifting to know that the branches and deaneries in countries far away are praying for us in Ely Diocese.



16 days of Activism Against gender Violence



Diocesan Mothers' Union braved strong winds and heavy showers to stand together in silence at 1.03pm Saturday on 27 November for 3 minutes to raise awareness for the 16 Days of Activism against Genderbased Violence. This international campaign from 25

November - 10 December, has been supported by Mothers' Union for many years.

Standing in silence outside the West End of Ely Cathedral, members were campaigning on this Global Day of Action, building on last year's focus of #nomore1in3 (no more one in three), highlighting the fact that 1 in 3 women worldwide will be impacted by some form of violence.

MU Members wore purple scarves in their solidarity and support of victims, and were joined by Canon Jessica Martin from the Cathedral and Diocesan MU Chaplain, Revd Mike Banyard. Our thanks go to those members who braved the elements to stand alongside those silently suffering from abuse.

Just to the right inside the main west door of Ely Cathedral is a display that will remain during the Campaign, which includes further information regarding the 16 Days of Activism Campaign and includes the work of the MU throughout the year supporting Women's Refuges locally.

It was good to see how the 16 Day campaign has grown over the years, with this year **Cambridgeshire Police** promoting the Elimination of Violence Against Women on November 25th by making the White Ribbon Day Promise, to never commit, excuse or remain silent about domestic violence and to encourage others to do the same. More information is available on the domestic abuse pages of the police website.

Cambridgeshire Libraries have been working with the Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Domestic Abuse Partnership <u>https://www.cambsdasv.org.uk/</u> to inform staff about domestic abuse and enable libraries to offer appropriate support and signposting for victims. In every library you can use a library computer to seek information and support without the risk of an abuser tracking your search. Library computers are free to use and cannot be monitored. The following libraries offer an enhanced "safe space", where library staff can offer a private room, phone and contact details for appropriate support services: Cambridge Central, Clay Farm, Ely, Huntingdon, March, St Ives, St Neots, Sawston, Wisbech.

A REFLECTION

Philip Baker (10th November 2021)

On 17th October India Knight wrote in the Times "Comment" - "There's only one kind of good book and that is the book – any book, in any genre – that makes you wish you could stay on the sofa with it all day." For me that book is the Bible; it not only holds the best story that has ever been written but, to the reader who is prepared to linger and consider, it delivers riches in thoughts and insights into human (and divine) purpose. As many of you may recall, following the death of Susan, my lifelong companion, I embarked on a 365-day reading plan of the Bible. A year having passed I have reached the end of that plan and the entire Bible has been read, cover to cover. And it was good! So good that I have bought a different translation and started again! It seems to me that as I now understand the "shape" of the Bible, what is in it, how it "works" so to speak, I might find a greater depth of meaning by studying a different translation. And so far, so good, the plan seems to be working (although I am still in Genesis!).

One of the things which even a non-reader of the bible will know is the importance of "Love" (at least in the New Testament after Jesus showed the way and changed Old Testament beliefs). Probably the best-known example of us being exhorted to "love" is in Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, chapter 13. If you are unsure, I urge you to read it. Yet there is still so little evidence of the world following this simple guide contained in the most-read book of all time. The world's super-rich are vying with each other to be the first to travel in space, to have the biggest super yacht, the most glamorous home. The world's dictators are growing rich on money diverted from aid intended for their starving populations. The world's terrorists are busy blowing each other and their perceived "enemies" up. To serve what end? I see only self-serving motives and little true philanthropy, or love for one's fellow human.

There is hope that attitudes may be changing. On the day recently that the veteran reporter, John Simpson, broke down whilst describing the plight of a widowed Afghan mother of 7 children, David Beasley, executive director of the UN World Food Programme, said that 23 million (yes, million) people in Afghanistan are facing starvation. Addressing world leaders and billionaires, he continued "when there's \$400 trillion of wealth on the earth today – shame on us if we let one child die from hunger, I don't care where that child is, shame on us." All this as Christmas approaches, when we remember the birth of one very special baby.

We can all do something; perhaps just little things, but collectively they can make big things happen. The Mothers' Union is doing things, the church is doing things, it is up to us all to do things. It is just a pity that more people, especially those in positions of authority, do not read the bible. If you read and understand the simple messages it contains it makes you appreciate that following its rules could put all things right.

PS If you enjoyed reading 1 Corinthians 13, read on – chapter 14 is pretty good too! Better still, start at chapter 1. It is a lovely letter, written by Paul to straying members of the church in Corinth around AD54, but still retaining meaning pertinent today – perhaps even more so!
